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HGTV Investigates "Love it or List It" Rumors Television Station Evaluates Partnership with Big Coat TV

Knoxville, Tenn. – **May 5, 2016** – Home and Garden Television is evaluating the claims of a North Carolina couple who participated on the HGTV show "Love It or List It." The couple is suing production company Big Coat TV for only using around \$85,000 of the \$140,000 the couple's investment for remodels while using the rest for staging the show. The couple also contends that the entire show was scripted and that the repairs were incomplete.

HGTV has yet to make an official statement on the situation. The company is contacting Big Coat TV, the producing company of "Love It or List It," to determine the validity of the couple's story. If the couple's claims are true, HGTV will take the action necessary to reprimand the production company for its lack of authenticity and exploitation.

HGTV executives reassure viewers that HGTV strives to be honest and inform audiences of the realities of home renovation and the real estate market while also educating its viewers of practical ways to improve their homes and living environments.

"Love It or List It" is a home renovation show dedicated to providing someone with the best home possible for their needs. Host and real estate expert Hilary Farr remodels the current home while host David Visentin searches for another home on the market. After renovations, the participant chooses either to stay in their current home or to move into the new home. 
